What Invigorates You?

In early April 2025, I was involved in a professional development opportunity for Oklahoma teachers at the NWOSU-Enid campus location. Along with 14 other Oklahoma educators who were there for the ride, we trekked through a “Choose Your Own Adventure” curriculum. In short, it was a fantastic event—and I was invigorated! As I reflected on why this was such a recharging event, I realized it was more than just the nostalgic theme. There were several dovetailing components that, I contend, serve as a palatable metaphor for the things that can invigorate us in higher education through the days, weeks, semesters, and academic years.

Perhaps the most obvious is the actual fun in “doing.” But it runs a bit deeper than that, because while doing the activities can be fun, the true motivation was to help others share in that enjoyment. For the PD I was involved in, this consisted of completing hands-on and minds-on physical science activities with others for grade-appropriate content. For the pages that follow in this Spotlight edition, this encompasses items such as performing in an event for the community, attending an excursion with students, publishing a collection

of student works, hosting K-12 events on campus, bringing in speakers from your discipline, and the like. We have so many members of our community that engage in their discipline in ways that invite others to share their passion, it’s invigorating!

Another element making a significant impression on me regarding the springtime PD was observing others express through their learning and participation the vested interest they held in deepening their understanding of concepts and pedagogy. Simply put, they were present—And they were present to get to work, eager to pull out of the day all that they could. It is fair to say that documented in the Spotlight, you will see numerous accounts of students being present and actively involved in their learning here at NWOSU. It is invigorating to see students taking advantage of the opportunities provided to them by faculty, administration, and the university.

Of course, working with colleagues is rewording in and of itself, too. I had the pleasure of working with Dr. Jenny Sattler to organize the PD event and coordinating with the Oklahoma Science Teaching Association board to

make the session a success for teachers from across the state. As is the case with previous editions of the Spotlight, you’ll find ample evidence of collaborations and teamwork that pull together programming for the benefit of many. This includes university employees as well as students, as students play critical roles in the success of university-sponsored programming (clinics, performances, outreach, service-learning, etc.). Seeing what’s been done and considering how past activity can serve as seeds for future activity is, as you may have guessed, invigorating!

To summarize, and to call attention to the broader theme at play, it is important to recognize that our contributions are part of a greater whole. There is no question that our individual accomplishments should be acknowledged. In addition, I would add that our disciplines, our departments, and our institution benefit greatly from our aspirations and goals as a collective. So thank you for all that you do, thank you for all that you’ve done, and thank you for continuing your adventures pursuing those things that invigorate you!

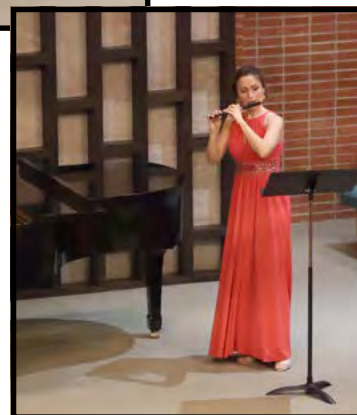

Social Work offering free infant mental health training

Northwestern's Department of Social Work continued its partnership with Haruv USA to provide a free infant mental health training series. This training series included a two-part session presenting "Attachment Style and Its Influence on Children" first and "Foundations of Infant Mental Health: Assessment, Diagnosis, and Treatment in Practice" second.

Lucy Shirisia, a professor at Utah Valley University, presented the first session of the series via Zoom on March 24.

"This training focused on the importance of creating a secure attachment with your child and its long-term effects, techniques in healing insecure attachment styles and practicing secure attachment style," Dr. Kylene Rehder, chair of the department of social work, social work program director and professor of social work, said.

Shirisia has taught for 10 years and is now earning a second graduate degree, a Ph.D. in health psychology. Her research and expertise are on Attachment Theory. Shirisia has worked as a caseworker for low-income families and was a foster care consultant. She has taught in early education schools and is a board member and co-chair of the conference committee of National Social Science Association (NSSA).

The second session will be presented by Tara Glenn, LCSW, IMH-E®, a Licensed Clinical Social Worker via Zoom on April 30 from 1 to 4 p.m.

This session will provide an interactive three-hour training to expand and strengthen participants' understanding of the foundational principles of infant mental health, providing a comprehensive overview of assessment, diagnosis and treatment for young children and their families. Participants will explore the core concepts

of reflective consultation and essential clinical skills needed to work effectively in this field.

"Through guided case study, attendees will gain practical insights into real-world applications, learning how to integrate these elements into their work with young children and caregivers," Rehder said. "This training emphasizes the importance of attachment, trauma-informed care and cultural responsiveness in promoting healthy emotional and relational development during the critical early years."

Glenn is an endorsed infant mental health clinician by the Oklahoma Association of Infant Mental Health. Her work has focused on treating childhood sexual abuse and trauma, treating families with infants/young children who have experienced scary and confusing things or have experienced attachment disruptions and serving adults with complex trauma histories.

Glenn is an Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) trained therapist as well as Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), Child-Parent Psychotherapy (CPP) and Circle of Security. She believes everyone is created for connection and with a purpose and wants to serve people so

that any barriers to that fulfillment can be diminished.

"We are thrilled to continue our partnership with Haruv USA and offer training that supports the work in the field of infant and early childhood mental health," Rehder said. "We encourage students and helping professionals from all disciplines to join us for an exciting afternoon of learning."

She added that this training is ideal for teachers, social workers, child welfare specialists, counselors and those in the medical field. Haruv USA is an international training institute that provides interprofessional education and training for professionals and students from many settings in the field of child maltreatment. Haruv USA's

Chartwells provides new hot food kiosk option

Chartwell's food service has a new food option for students, employees and the general public on the Alva campus. A vending kiosk that serves hot, fresh food has been installed in the Student Center and is accessible 24 hours a day.

Food options change based on inventory, but currently include:

- Sausage breakfast burrito
- Glazed donuts
- White chocolate chunk cookies
- Turkey sausage and egg biscuits
- Glazed cinnamon roll donut
- Hot pockets
- Chocolate chip cookie stuffed with hazelnut
- Turkey melt sandwich

"We are excited to give students another food option on campus," Charles Craddock, Chartwell's food director, said. "This is accessible 24 hours a day, so students can come use the machine at any hour for some great food."

Users can order at the kiosk or use the Just Baked app. Once the order is queued, food is ready within seconds. All nutritional and allergen facts are listed before ordering. The kiosk accepts credit/debit cards, Google Pay, Samsung Pay, Apple pay, etc. The machine does not take cash, and students cannot use flex dollars.

“The NWOSU Concert Band

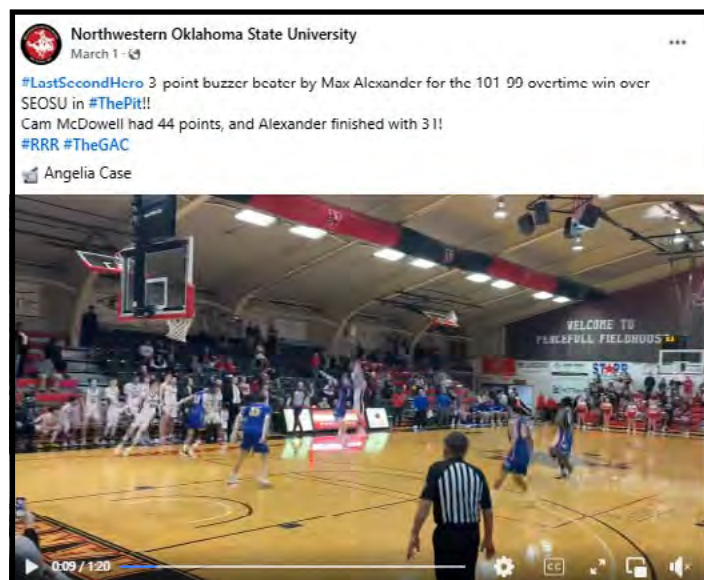
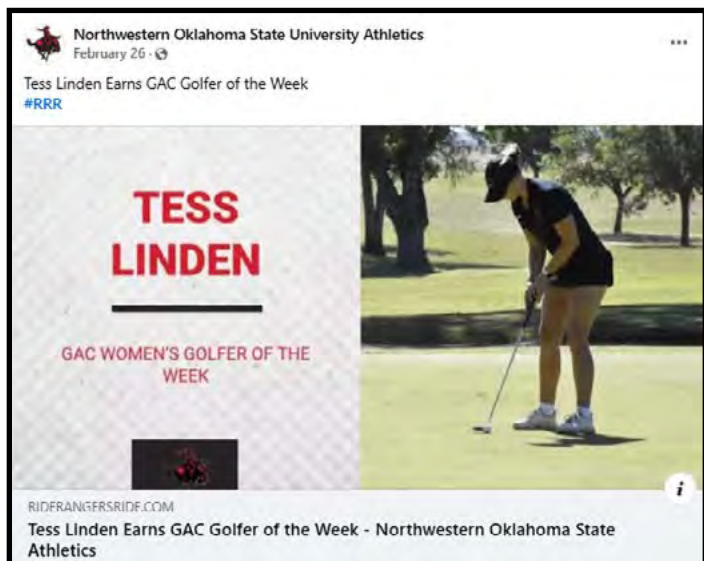
only performs in this way three times throughout each school year,” Perkins said. “This event is important as it shows the hard work and dedication our students have to the instrumental music program at Northwestern.”

Free Summer STEM Camp at Northwestern June 1-6

Oklahoma students in grades 9-12 in fall 2025 were welcome to register to attend a free summer STEM camp at Northwestern-Alva June 1-6. Registration for “Renewable Energy – The Future is Here – Exploring and Learning Today: A Summer STEM Camp.” The camp was limited to 25 students.

This camp was funded by a grant from the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education. Northwestern played host to the camp along with High Plains Technology Center of Woodward, OG&E, and NextEra Energy, the largest producer of wind and solar power in the nation.

“This is a great educational opportunity for these high school students,” Dr. Tim Maharry, professor of mathematics and chair of the mathematics and computer science department, said.

During the camp, students engaged in hands-on learning with professionals in higher education as well as professionals in the field of renewable energy.

Students got an inside view of

an operating nacelle, experience simulators and a climbing tower, and saw an operational Renewable Energy Site. Students learned about the generation and use of electricity as well as an introduction to electronics and robotics. Students received hands-on experiences with the Renewable Energy Trainer. This portable Microgrid training device includes power generation, a micro-inverter, and storage using renewable energy technology.

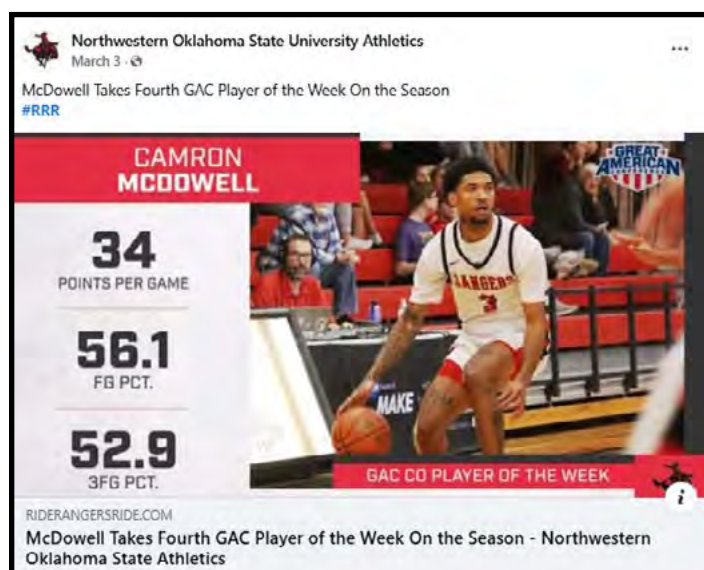
Students also built and assembled a wind turbine and learned about solar power and hydro-electric power.

The camp included field trips to Alabaster Caverns State Park, High Plains Technology Center in Woodward, and the Sooner Wind

site near Mooreland.

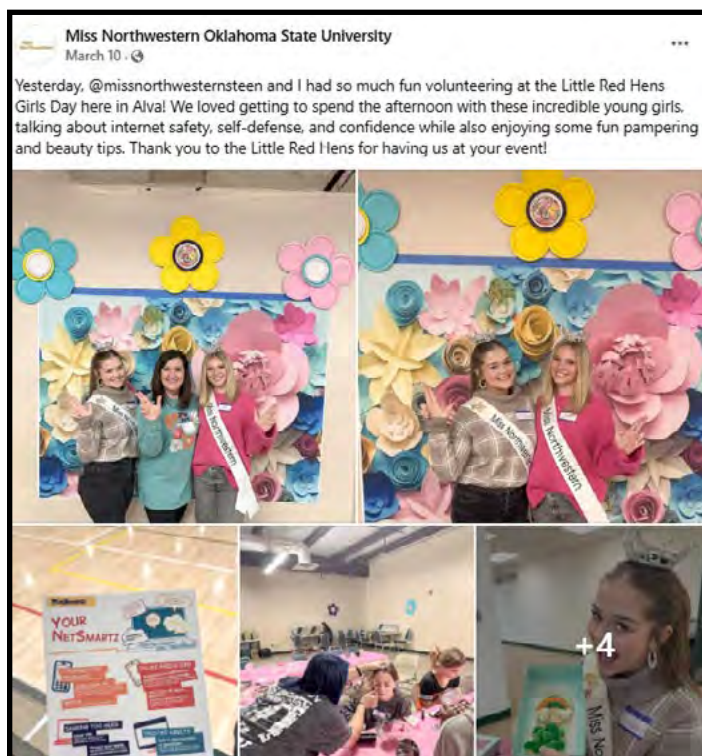
of social work. "We are grateful for all of our past and present field instructors."

"I have loved Swansea so far!" Cloud said. "Getting to experience a new community and learning about the culture and identity of Swansea has been so much fun, and the school itself here has also been accommodating and fantastic. I've gotten to travel across Wales to St. David's, Cardiff, Oxwich and Port Eynon while seeing so many great sights and places."

Cloud was nominated by Dr. Timothy Maharry, mathematics and computer science department chair. Maharry served as Cloud's academic adviser from 2021-2024.

Cloud was also nominated by Ethan Sacket, Northwestern Student Success coordinator.

"As a student, John has made such a positive impact on so many here at Northwestern, and we're grateful he's been awarded the Brad Henry International Scholar opportunity," Sacket said. "I know he is stewarding this unique time well to learn and experience as much as possible."

Cloud received funding for tuition and lodging for a full semester of study at Swansea University, as well as a stipend to help with other expenses such as airfare and passport fees to and from the UK.

"It was terrifying to come here at first," Cloud said, "but thanks to Christ, I was able to find the strength to make this my temporary home."

Sacket believed Cloud was up to the task.

"Living in an entirely new country without knowing anyone prior would be outside the comfort zones of many," Sacket said. "However, beyond the comfort zone is where great growth is dis-

covered, so I am beyond excited for the development John experiencing this past semester in the UK."

The Brad Henry International Scholarship program was established by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education in June 2008. The Regents provide a stipend for students selected to participate in the semester-long study or research programs affiliated with Swansea University. Recipients are selected by a committee of State Regents' staff based on their excellent academic performance, outstanding communication skills, exemplary character, and exceptional leadership, maturity and judgment.

"John was there for a special purpose, and the Ranger Family is excited to hear about his adventures and how those experiences prepare him for what is next in his life's journey when he's back in Oklahoma," Sacket said.

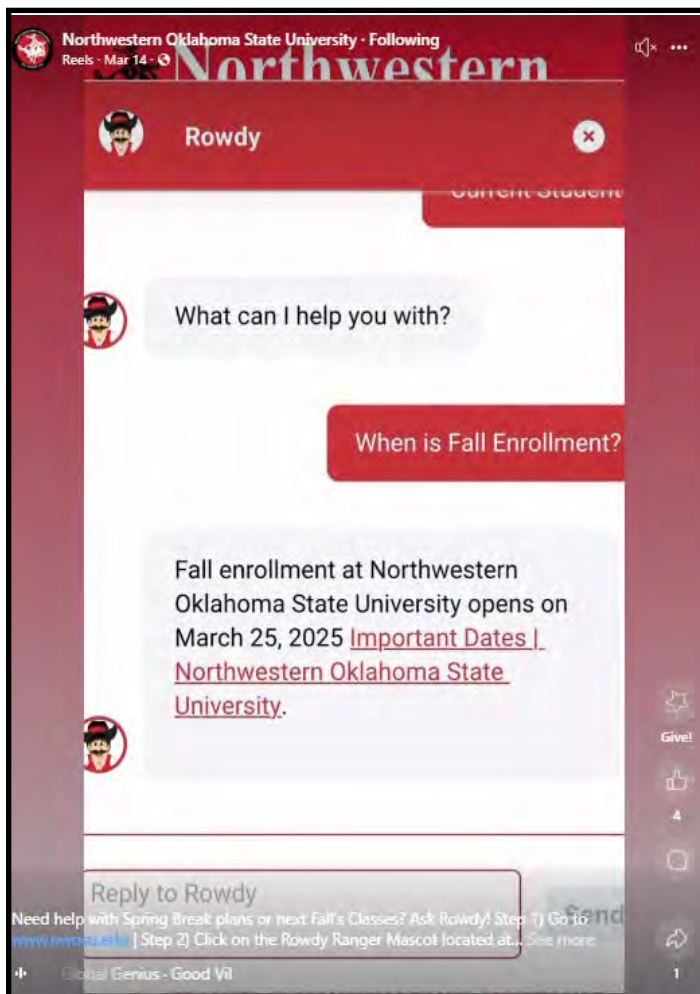
Cloud encouraged his fellow students to learn more about the opportunity.

Education policy listening session at Woodward Campus

Northwestern played host to the Oklahoma Appleseed Center for Law and Justice for an education policy listening session Tuesday, April 15, in the Northwestern-Woodward campus commons area.

The Oklahoma Appleseed Center is a statewide social justice non-profit law firm. Its education justice coalition, Advance Oklahoma's Kids, is playing host to the Better Outcomes for Oklahoma's Kids (B.O.O.K.) initiative, a four-month education policy listening session across Oklahoma with the intended goal to create policy-oriented solutions to present to the Oklahoma Legislature for 2026 session.

Advance Oklahoma's Kids is spending the next year gathering input, feedback and ideas about education from Oklahomans. The coalition aims to produce a set of 10 to 15 concrete policy recommendations for adoption through the legislature, State Department of Education, local school districts and community stakeholders to strengthen Oklahoma's public education system by 2030.

Dinner was served, followed by an introduction and presentation of the B.O.O.K. Initiative, a message from Western Plains Family and Youth Services and group discussions on education policy topics.

"This is inspired in part by the example of House Bill 1017, the landmark education legislation of 1990 developed on the basis of citizen input and a far-ranging education reform agenda that passed into law," said Shelby Bomford, education justice organizer. "Now, 35 years later, while we are in a markedly different political and policy landscape, it is time to revive the spirit of HB 1017 by bringing Oklahomans together behind a bold, ambitious, forward-thinking education agenda."

Specific topics to be discussed were strengthening the external environment, supporting the teaching profession, and special needs and accommodations.

"Our schools need support, but for years our leaders have refused to invest in public schools, taking resources and opportunities away from our students," Bomford said. "The quality of a child's education shouldn't depend on how much you pay a private school, or even how close you live to private schools, which don't exist in many parts of our state. When public schools are supported, they can meet the unique needs of our rural, urban, and suburban communities, bolstering our students' ability to develop the skills they need in school and life. Faced with a steady barrage of hostile actions and rhetoric, public school advocates are often left in a purely defensive crouch, rather than putting forward a positive

agenda that will improve our schools and lead to better outcomes for all Oklahoma's kids."

Schroeder's podcast offers real-world insight into today's media industry

Dr. Jesse Schroeder, associate professor of communication at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, is using his academic and television industry experiences to launch a podcast that provides a behind-the-scenes look at today's media landscape.

After finishing his faculty portfolio this past year, he decided he'd like to enhance his scholarly activities but discovered there is not much content available when it comes to research in the media industry. So earlier this spring semester, he created a scholarly podcast titled "Masterclass: Media Matters."

Through thoughtful conversations between Schroeder and his guests, this podcast will provide industry analysis and real-world stories from his media professional contacts, offering information for aspiring journalists, other media professionals and those who are curious about the profession in general.

A new episode will be available each Monday, where listeners will learn more about the media profession from the perspective of those actively working in it.

Schroeder explained that the podcast serves four key audiences: students seeking industry knowledge, researchers and educators looking to align academia with current trends, professionals eager to learn from peers, and media consumers wanting a clearer view into how the industry operates. Together, these perspectives create a space for learning, collaboration, and deeper understanding of today's ever-shifting media landscape.

"Anyone who consumes media content can be enlightened by what they may learn about the industry," Schroeder said. "In today's climate, there are multiple streams of disinformation and misunderstanding surrounding the way media works. Media consumers can learn from industry leaders about how the business works and what goes into making decisions that impact what they receive as the media consumer."

Schroeder said he is also learning from these industry professionals and is sharing this information with his current students.

"Many times, what I learn simply validates what I'm teaching," Schroeder said. "Other times, it gives me a new perspective or idea I want to share with my students."

He said he originally planned to require his students to listen to each episode, but soon discovered that many of them had subscribed

to the podcast and were listening to the episodes on their own, allowing for discussion in classes.

A recent guest on the podcast deals with the timely 30th anniversary of the bombing of the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City on April 19, 1995. Schroeder shares an interview with Robin Marsh, a news anchor/reporter at KWTW News 9 in Oklahoma City, who was one of the first journalists on the ground that day. She discusses her coverage of the tragic event and the days following, along with some wisdom she's learned over the years.

Other interviews on the podcast so far include:

- Rachel Knapp, a national news correspondent in Washington, D.C., shares what it's like to work at the network level and with politicians in DC.

- Jason Goodwin, an assistant news director at KLTW/KTRE in Tyler, Texas, where Schroeder also worked as a main evening anchor from 2021-2023. Goodwin shares advice on the changes in the media industry and what he looks for when hiring.

- Joseph Perez, a news producer in Houston, Texas, and a former student of Schroeder's who is a Northwestern graduate. Perez discusses his role behind the camera and creating content. He also talks about how digital news is now first in most newsrooms with TV news coming in second.

- Daniella Rivera, an investigative journalist in Salt Lake City, Utah, shares information regarding her field. Her station invests in doing investigations, and her stories have prompted major political

change in some cases.

- Cody Gottschalk, a broadcast meteorologist at KLTV/KTRE in Tyler, Texas, shares about his role as a TV meteorologist and how digital news and weather consumption has changed the way he gets information out.

- Amy Wilson, a Western Lifestyle Media Professional. She is the former host on RFD-TV and Cowboy Channel and is a former Miss Rodeo America. Wilson now works for the Equine Network. She discusses media-related jobs outside of the traditional news setting.

- Devyn Shea, a digital news host at KOLD-TV in Tucson, Arizona, will be on the April 21 episode. She discusses how news consumption has changed with a focus now on digital media content. She hosts from a live streaming news desk in the middle of the KOLD newsroom every weekday.

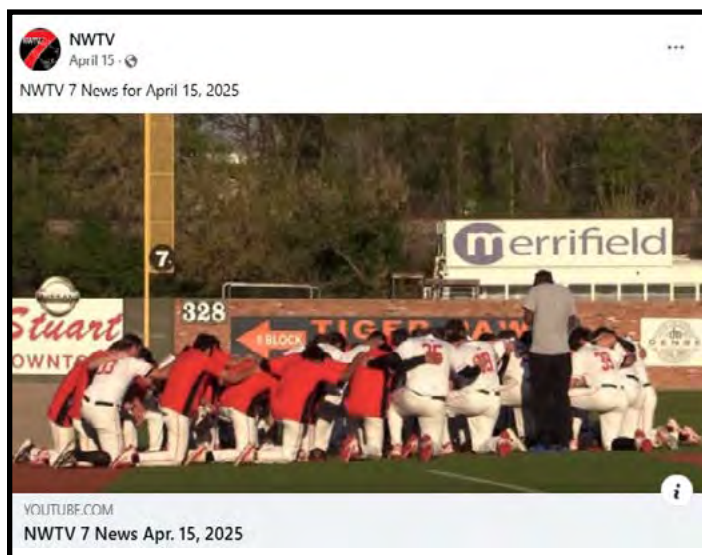
The Freedom native is a 2003 graduate of Northwestern's mass communication program and went to work immediately in the radio and television news industry. During this time, he also started work on his master's degree. In 2006, he was offered the broadcast media position at Northwestern and finished his master's degree in 2007. He taught in the communication department for eight years and earned a Ph.D. in Education Technology Management in 2011. He left Northwestern in 2014 when he was offered a morning anchor position at KXII in Sherman, Texas. After several years there, he and his family moved to Tyler, Texas, in 2021 where he worked as a main evening anchor at KLTV/KTRE television. In 2023, his contract was up in Tyler, and he decided not to renew it. He and his family felt it was time to move back home

to northwest Oklahoma, where he was able to return to Northwestern and start teaching in the communication department once again.

“It is so nice to be back, and to be able to teach and mentor the next generation of communication majors,” Schroeder said.

He is married to Amanda, also a Northwestern graduate. They have three children, Brayden and Parker, who are current Northwestern students, and Mia, who attends Freedom Public Schools.

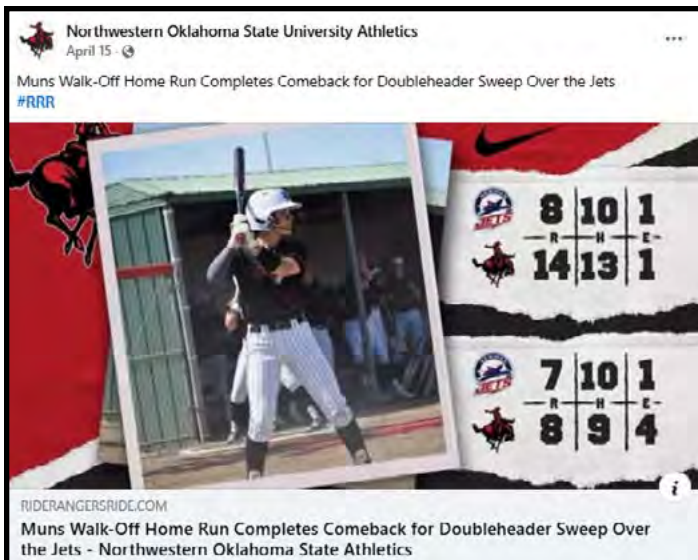

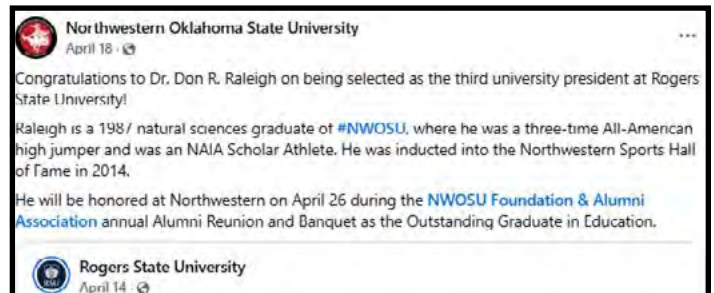

Sepsis diagnosis leads to service journey for Schroeders

The summer sun of 2024 bore down on Freedom, OK, as it always does—hot, heavy, and unrelenting. But for Amanda Schroeder, it wasn't the heat that would haunt the summer season. It was something invisible, insidious, and nearly fatal.

It began quietly. A discomfort here. A fever there. But soon, Amanda's condition spiraled. Amanda had not been feeling well for several weeks; however, on June 3 her body just couldn't push through the pain any longer. She asked her husband, Jesse, to take her to urgent care at Share Medical Center in Alva. Once they arrived, she was moved to the emergency room. It was discovered Amanda was battling sepsis, a life-threatening infection coursing through her bloodstream. The situation quickly became a fight for survival. She was taken by Air Evac helicopter transport to the ICU at St. Anthony Hospital in Oklahoma City. The weeks that followed were a blur—oxygen monitors, central line antibiotics, and extensive testing. The sterile walls of St. Anthony became the battleground where she fought for her life.

After what felt like an eternity, Amanda was stable enough to return home to Freedom—a town as close-knit as it is remote. But the fight wasn't over.

Only days after returning, Amanda's blood pressure plummeted. Her body, still fragile from sepsis, was failing again.

The call to 911 wasn't just a cry for help—it was a lifeline. Within minutes, the Freedom volunteer ambulance crew arrived, offering immediate care. With precious

seconds ticking by, they headed toward Woodward to intercept with Woodward County EMS. Why was an intercept needed? Why didn't the Freedom ambulance take her directly to Integris Health in Woodward? There are four levels of pre-hospital care. Emergency Medical Responder (EMR), Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) and Paramedic. Each level is able to provide higher levels of intervention. Amanda needed the care of a paramedic, and Woodward County EMS employs paramedics at their service.

Between Freedom and Mooreland, the flashing ambulance lights of Freedom's ambulance met up with the strobing ambulance lights of Woodward County EMS. On shift that night was paramedic, Chris Syms, whom had the advanced skills Amanda now desperately needed. What no one knew then, what no one could have known, was that this man wouldn't just help save Amanda's life. He would help change Amanda and Jesse's life, too.

Amanda would go on to spend another week in the ICU in Woodward, her condition finally stabilizing. Recovery from sepsis isn't measured in days—it's a slow, uncertain road. Some never return to the people they were before. But

Amanda, resilient as ever, began to climb her way back.

And that's when everything changed.

As the haze of crisis gave way to clarity, Amanda and Jesse started seeing what had always been in front of them: the fragility of their rural EMS system. At the time of Amanda's emergency, Freedom had just one certified EMT. One. If that individual was out of town, the ambulance couldn't run. Residents

would have to fend for themselves or wait for help from neighboring towns—many miles and precious minutes away. Thankfully, that one EMT, Marlo Smith, was available the night Amanda needed help.

The realization hit hard. But it also sparked something.

"Our community needs us," Amanda said one evening, "we should step up and help too."

So, in December of 2024, Amanda and Jesse began their

EMT training. Amanda and Jesse—two people with no medical background, no illusions of heroism—stepped into a world they barely understood.

Chris Syms—the paramedic who met Amanda that night on the roadside, who fought alongside Amanda for her life—became their instructor. Not only is Syms a paramedic for Woodward County EMS, he is also an instructor for Heartland Medical Direction, the organization through which Amanda and Jesse were being trained. Syms' calm under pressure attitude, his depth of knowledge, his quiet compassion... it all made sense. Amanda and Jesse trained under the very person who had helped Amanda during her time of need.

The two thought the training would be “lighter” for volunteers. After all, they weren't being paid. But there's no such thing as half-way in emergency medicine. The curriculum was grueling. They

studied trauma, cardiac emergencies, respiratory distress, medical assessments, and child birth. They practiced extrications, tourniquets, and airway management. They took three major exams: the Fisdap, the hands-on skills evaluation, and the NREMT national board exam. It wasn't easy. It wasn't supposed to be.

Today, Amanda and Jesse are Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians. Talk about full circle moment. They proudly serve on Freedom's EMS—not because they planned it, but because life took them on a detour that became a calling. At times, when training or

helping Woodward County EMS, they serve with Syms, shoulder to shoulder, not just as students or survivors, but as teammates.

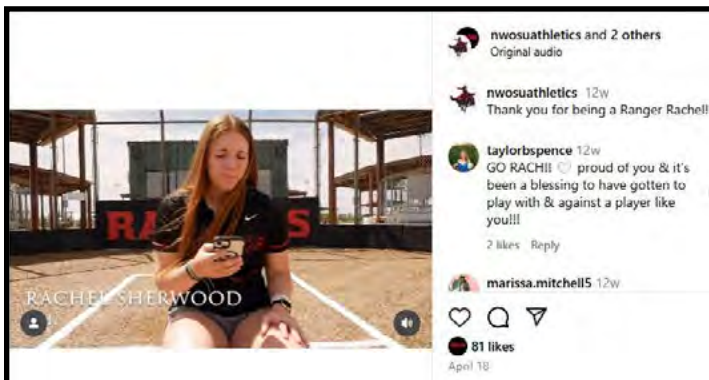
There's a heartbeat to rural communities that can't be measured in sirens or census numbers. It's in the neighbors who show up. It's in the volunteers who answer the call—sometimes literally. And it's in the people who say, someone has to do it... so why not me?

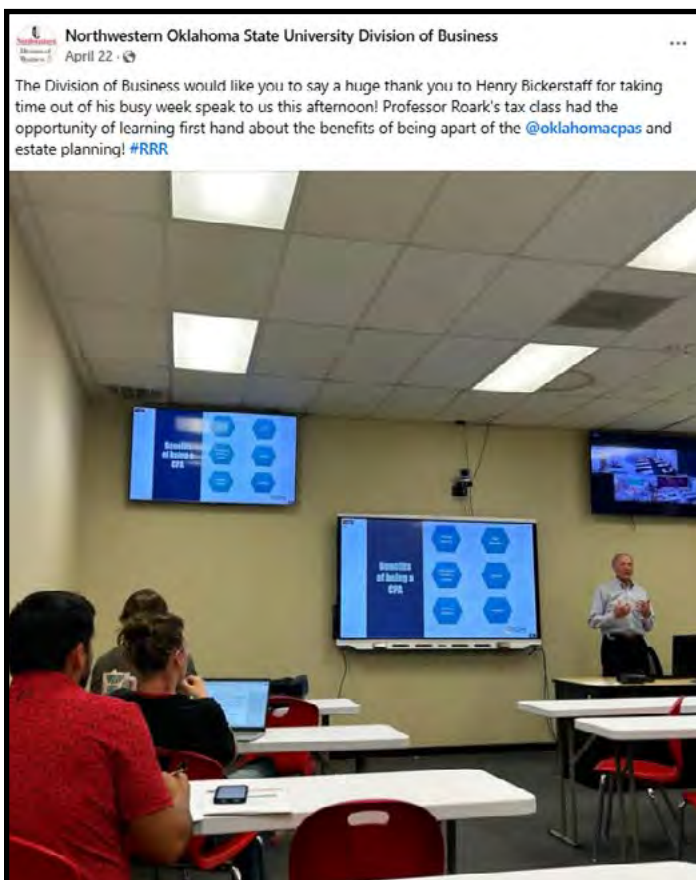
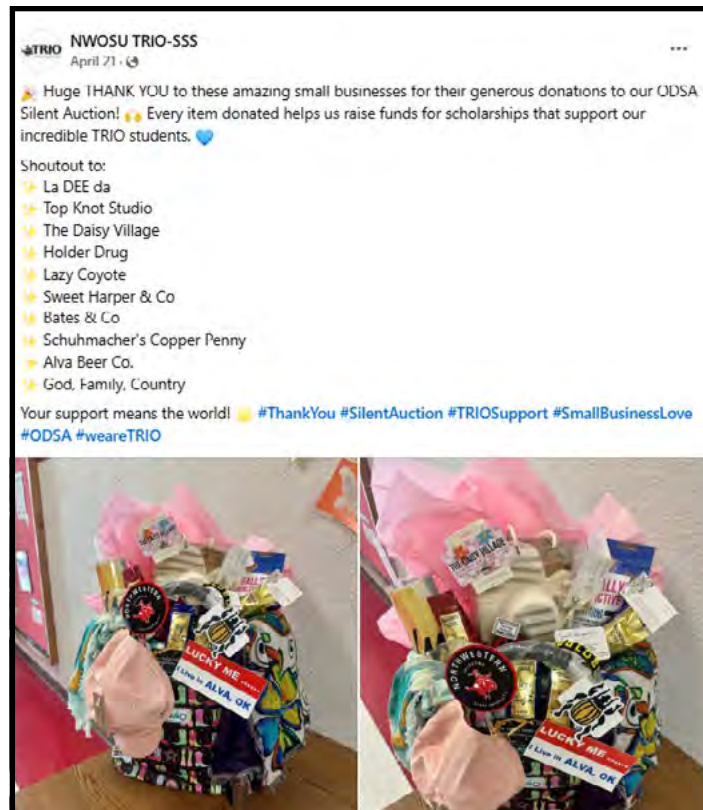
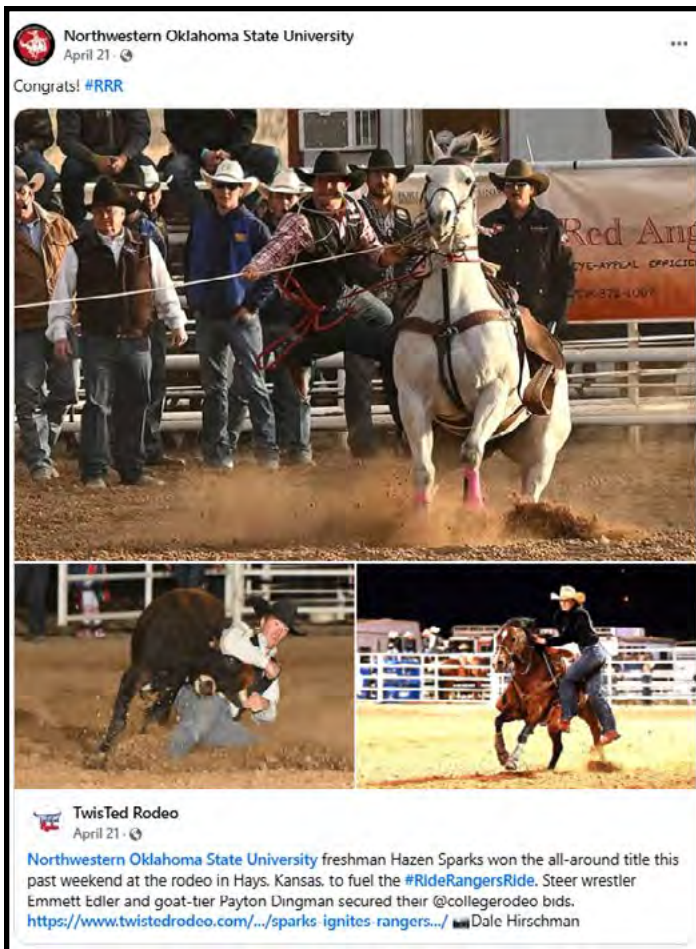
This is more than a story of illness and recovery. It's about discovering your place in a community not just through crisis, but through action. It's about how one family's emergency became their purpose.

And that's a story worth answering the call for.

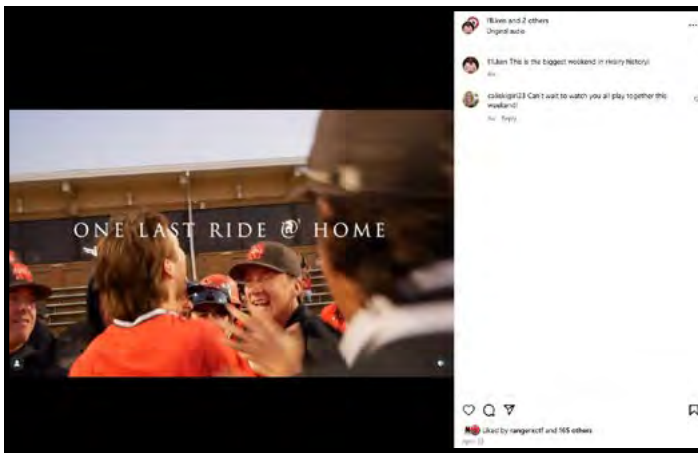
Evan Vaverka, instructor of computer science and Esports manager, said the main goal of the camps was for the students attending to have a fun day of playing video games.

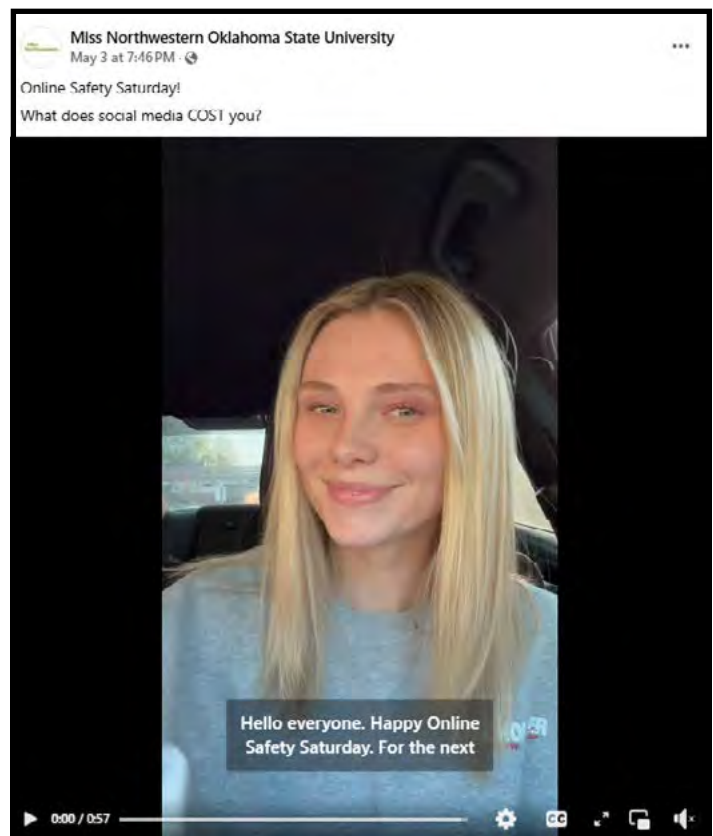
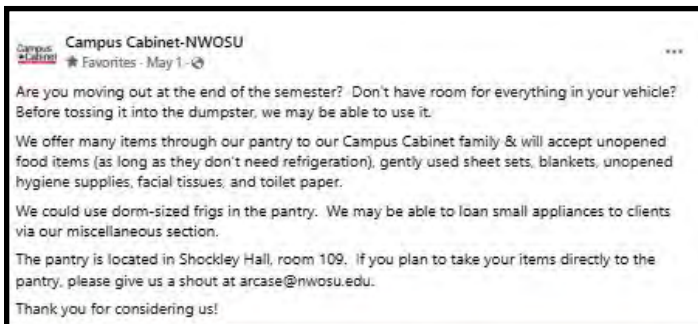
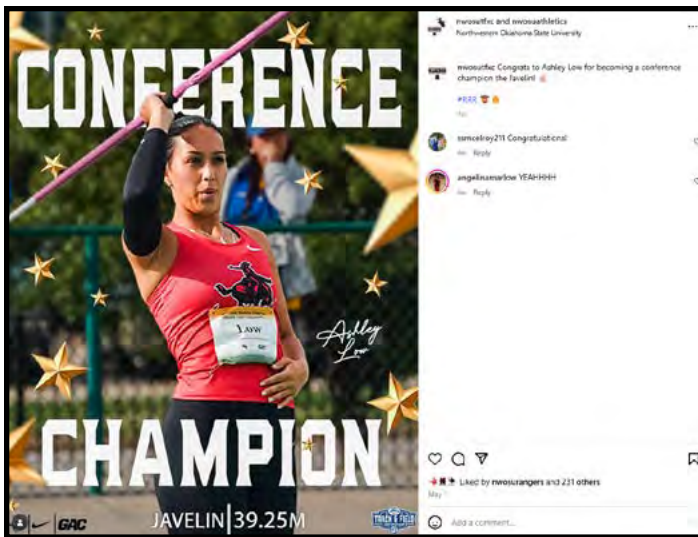
Pi Gamma Mu is an international social sciences honor society dedicated to promoting excellence in social sciences and upholding scholarship, leadership and service.

SWAT supports awareness through Wooden Children Project

In honor of National Child Abuse Prevention Month, the Northwestern Oklahoma State University Social Workers Association of Tomorrow (SWAT) proudly participated in the Wooden Children Project, an annual awareness initiative organized by The CARE Campus and Fourth Judicial District CASA Program of Oklahoma.

Throughout the month of April, handcrafted wooden child figures—each symbolizing a confirmed case of child abuse or neglect—are displayed on the Garfield County Courthouse lawn in Enid.

Project organizers noted that in 2024, there were 263 confirmed cases in Garfield County; 72 in Woodward County; 46 in Blaine County; 21 in Major County; 29 in Kingfisher County; and 12 in Grant County.

They added that although these numbers reflect the confirmed cases, it is important to note that child abuse is often underreported, highlighting the ongoing need for increased community awareness and action.

The CARE Campus, formerly the Garfield County Child Advocacy Council, has organized the Wooden Children Project for more

than a decade. Each figure, approximately two to three feet tall, is cut and painted by local volunteers. For a sponsorship of \$35, individuals, organizations and businesses can “foster” a wooden child by dressing and displaying them as part of the campaign.

This year, Northwestern’s SWAT chapter fostered two wooden children, contributing to the visual representation of abused and neglected children in the area.

“This initiative aims to increase awareness of the prevalence of child abuse and neglect within our communities,” said Codi Harding, SWAT sponsor and assistant professor of social work. “SWAT hopes this project reminds the community that we all share responsibility in safeguarding children.”

Beyond raising awareness, the Wooden

Children Project serves as a call to action. The CARE Campus encourages community members to get involved by sponsoring a wooden child, volunteering as a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) or donating to support local advocacy efforts.

“Together, we can help protect children and create a safer future for all,” Harding said.

As part of their commitment to child welfare, SWAT also reminds the public that all Oklahoma residents are mandated reporters of suspected child abuse and neglect.

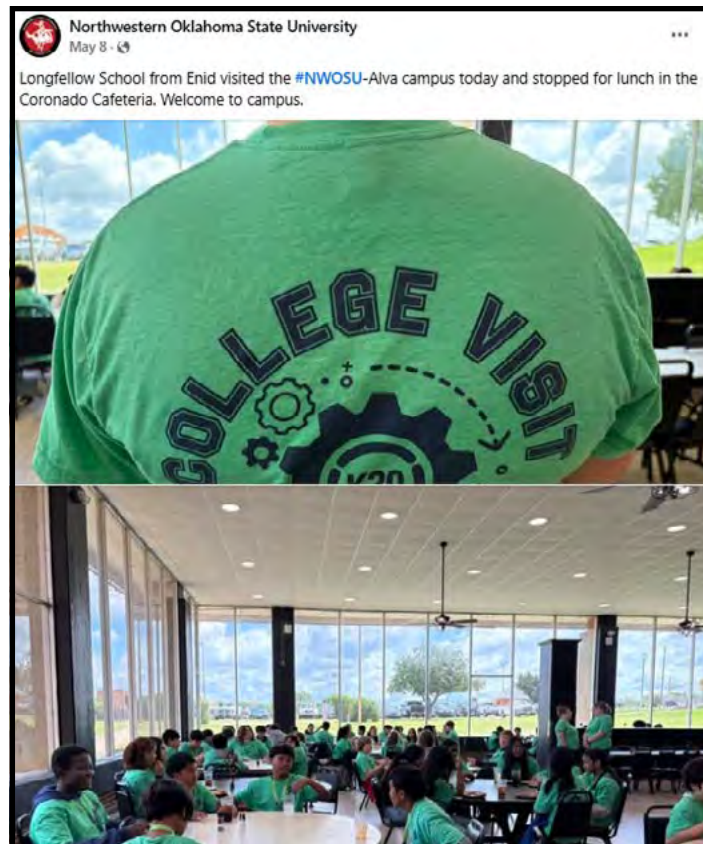
Several changes and improvements happened on campus through the semester.

8th Annual DNP Residency Week set for July 13-17

Students in the Wisdom Family Foundation Doctoral Program for Rural Nursing Practice summer residency program were on the Northwestern Alva campus in July.

During residency week, students checked off on their physical assessment skills to get ready to learn in a clinical setting. They also have an introductory experience to common procedures they would encounter in primary care such as suturing, eye injuries and biopsies.

Local businesses Kiowa Meat Locker and Moore's Venture Foods helped make this experience possible by donating pig feet to practice suturing with and overripe produce for biopsy simulation.

The 2025 DNP graduates' poster presentation were open to the public at the J.W. Martin Library. The program sought volunteers for children and well-woman exams conducted by the family nurse practitioner students. Children exams were conducted Tuesday, July 15. The well-woman exams were conducted on Wednesday, July 16. All volunteer events took place on the Northwestern-Alva campus.

"The event puts a spotlight on our DNP program at Northwestern," said Dr. Gwyneth Holderby, DNP program director and assistant professor nursing.

The Northwestern DNP pro-

gram was ranked the No. 1 Online Nurse Practitioner Program in the U.S. in 2021 and was rated No. 4 by EduMed.org for Online Higher Education in Healthcare in 2023.

Applications for entry into any of Northwestern's nursing programs are accepted Oct. 1 through Feb. 1 for the next fall's class. Interested students can apply for the BSN-to-DNP program, the traditional Bachelor of Science in Nursing program and the online RN-to-BSN program.

Dr. David Pecha, Northwestern executive vice president and general chairman of the homecoming committee, expressed gratitude for the numerous submissions for both theme and parade marshal this year.

This year’s theme was submitted by Shawna Gilbert, assistant professor of library science and access services librarian of J.W. Martin Library. Gilbert received \$25 worth of Alva Chamber of Commerce “Chamber Bucks” as a prize for her winning submission.

Leading the parade as parade marshal will be retired professor of chemistry and longstanding Northwestern supporter, Dr. Kenneth Brown.

Brown is originally from a town

He volunteers four days a week at Share Medical Center as well as sitting on the Alva Hospital Authority and Northwest Family Services board. During the summer, Brown also works at the Salt Plains Refuge Center, a job he started as a Northwestern faculty member and he’s retained for over 20 years. He also handles maintenance and operations of the historic Runnymede in downtown Alva. These

countless volunteer hours earned him the Volunteer of the Year award from the Alva Chamber of Commerce in 2017.

Some of Brown’s favorite memories around the Northwestern Homecoming activities are from the parade itself, making his selection as parade marshal a full-circle moment. He has assisted the Miss Cinderella candidates at the Runnymede for several years and looks back fondly at bringing his kids to the parades in years past.

“My daughter who lives in New Jersey is already making her plans to be here,” Brown said. “It’s a big family thing for us.”

5 micro-credentials now offered for added student knowledge

Five micro-credentials are now being offered at Northwestern in order to offer students and professionals more knowledge in very specific areas.

Micro-credentials are tightly focused learning experiences that allow you to acquire knowledge or skillsets essential to a particular career demand. While micro-credentials may consist of credit-bearing or non-credit-bearing components, Northwestern's micro-credentials programs are primarily credit-bearing and embedded in other degree programs. This means that they may be used to satisfy requirements for a bachelor's degree while simultaneously giving you a vital professional skillset or body of knowledge. You may also choose to take a micro-credential in isolation to develop critical workforce skills for a current or future job.

Micro-credentials are available in these areas:

- Alternative Certification in Graduate Education.
- Corrections Professional
- Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health
- Science of Reading
- Spanish for ESL Pedagogy

Dr. Kylene Rehder, department chair for social work work, reports 27 professionals have successfully completed the micro-credential, underscoring the growing interest and need for specialized training in this area.

We were recently sent a newspaper clipping from March 15, 1937, A little over 88 years ago, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt visited Alva to be the guest of honor for the dedication services for the new buildings, Jesse Dunn and Horace Mann (now the Joe J. Struckle Education Center).

The content appears below, which was published in The Anthony Times.

'Peace' subject Mrs. Roosevelt

Public Hears Timely Subject Discussed at Alva Dedication Service Friday Night.

Friday, March 12, will long be remembered by the citizens of Alva, Okla., as a "new era in education" was marked by an address of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt. Approximately 25,000 former graduates of Northwestern State Teachers' college, and people from the surrounding towns, were on hand throughout the day to take part in the celebration dedicating the Jesse Dunn and Horace Mann halls which cost more than a half million dollars to construct.

The First Lady of the Land spoke to an assembly of Alva college students Friday morning on the subject "Problems of Youth." Then, at noon she extended greetings from the White House to members of the visiting press who were guests of the college at a luncheon meeting. High school seniors from all over this section of the country listened in eagerness to her informal chat on a "Typical Day at the White House."

Her evening address on "Peace," which was open to the public, found the spacious Jesse Dunn auditorium filled to capacity.

"Peace," Mrs. Roosevelt said, "is one of the most important things to talk about today. We have too often resorted to force to achieve what we wish. Now times have changed. First of all peace must begin in the minds and hearts of the individual people. A real desire to tackle this subject is the only difficulty."

"Peace is going to cost us something. Effort, study, and unselfishness are the three fundamental things we are going to have to consider before we can hope to attain it."
